Join us either in person at the Pusey House Library or online to read one of the most important mystical texts from the Early Church period, tracing the path of Moses from his birth and slavery in Egypt to the (endless!) ascent of the Mountain, with St Gregory as our guide to the spiritual meaning of every step of his/our journey. ### Study Day: St Gregory of Nazianzus - Trinity & Salvation

An introduction to the life and work of St Gregory of Nazianzus (c. 330 - 390 AD). Gregory 'The Theologian' was one of the three Cappadocian Fathers, and a key player in the fourth century trinitarian controversy. The day will compare some 'common sense' views-from-some-Western-pews on the divinity of Christ with Gregory's approach, as set out in his five *Theological Orations*, as well as surveying his understanding of the 'shape' of salvation.



### Study Day: St Gregory of Nyssa - Humanity & Spirituality

An introduction to the life and work of St Gregory of Nyssa (c. 335 - 395 AD), the youngest of the three Cappadocian Fathers and one of the earliest mystics. The day will dive into Nyssa's (really positive) understanding of what it is to be human, the importance of our divine image-likeness and free will, the choices set before us, our (infinite) journey into God, and the necessity of an ever-changing perception of the divine.
